


THE LEWIS AND CLARK TRAIL

The Lewis and Clark Expedition (1804-1806) covered over 8000 miles. Beginning near St. Louis, the explorers traveled up the Missouri River to the Rocky Mountains, crossed the Continental Divide, and continued on to the Pacific Ocean. Highlighted on the Lewis and Clark Trail map above is the section of the Rocky Mountains described in this brochure.

- Missoula, Montana --- Missoula County Courthouse, murals by E.S. Paxson





This detailed map/brochure provides an historically accurate account of the Lewis and Clark Expedition through the Rocky Mountains of western Montana and east-central Idaho. Both the westward (1805) and eastward (1806) journeys are traced here. Over one hundred twenty-five Lewis and Clark campsites along with fifty points of interest are identified on this map and keyed to the narrative on the back. Campsites identified by only a date were shared by Lewis and Clark within the time indicated. Where the officers were separated, their campsites are identified with the date plus L for Lewis or C for Clark. The completion of Lewis and Clark's journey through the Rocky Mountains from Lolo Pass to the Weippe Prairie of Idaho (indicated on this map) is told in detail on the Forest Service's brochure *Following Lewis and Clark across the Clearwater National Forest*. Forest Service maps, brochures and general information about the forests are available at Forest Service offices and visitor centers.
